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# PASTOR'S REPORT

## Overview

We are in a healthy place as a congregation, and God has shown us how to maintain our well-being and grow spiritually. We thank God for guiding us forward. He has revealed important truths in His Word and raised up leaders to help us grow.

Building on this foundation of well-being, we have seen God accomplish significant work this year. One notable example was the fulfillment of the Yalunka Covenant signed in July 2001. We rejoice that a healthy church is with the Yalunka people. This does not mean we will stop praying for them, but we can rejoice knowing we have stayed faithful to our promise to support the Yalunka people until a healthy church was established. At the Missionary Church National Conference, World Partners recognized Sturgis Missionary Church as faithful to the Yalunka Covenant when speaking about the missionary work of Bruce and Dawn Cluckie.

The ministry team and elders took time to determine the core measures for a healthy church, with an emphasis on the culture needed to pursue them.

- Harmony: Attendee is operating as a part of the body of Christ
- Abiding: Attendee is regularly hearing from God
- Transformation: Attendee is working on a righteous change in their life
- Praising God: Attendee glorifying God
- Kingdom Impact: Attendee is participating in God's Work
- Discipling: Attendee is investing spiritually into someone

## Sensory Room

The challenges families face with special needs limit their ability to participate in all aspects of services or children's programming. There are many families in the Sturgis community who are believers without a church home because of the unique needs of their child. Having a place for children with special needs and sensory needs to connect to Jesus in a way that gives them the time they need to communicate and understand things they can't in a normal setting is crucial to holding to our values and vision.

A sensory room is a designated area for neurodivergent individuals and others to retreat from overwhelming church stimuli. These rooms offer tools and a calming environment, with features that help regulate their senses and help them participate in the community without becoming overstimulated or anxious. Our desire would be to eventually offer this as a classroom setting.

To help us navigate next steps, a group of ministry leaders is putting together a plan. Some of the team visited Hope Missionary Church in Bluffton, IN, to tour their sensory room and discuss their special needs ministry.

## Iglesia Misionera en Sturgis

Iglesia Misionera and Sturgis Missionary Church are working to bring Iglesia Misionera into our ministries. Discussions have been made with the Hispanic ministry, regional directions, and Granger Missionary Church, which has a Hispanic ministry.

We look forward to how God will use this new ministry to reach more people for Christ. We were blessed to share services with them before our church picnic and on Christmas Eve.

## **Personal Growth**

At the beginning of the year, I started making changes to how I present my messages. I hope they have been beneficial to everyone. I sought feedback from the elders, the church board, and the ministry team to ensure my changes were appropriate. I have been encouraged to see this as a good change, based on the positive feedback I have received from these groups and other church attendees.

Each month, I attend a healthy church cohort through the North Central Region, and I meet with the three local Missionary Church pastors. Each quarter, I complete five mobile education courses. I also complete various training programs offered by the denomination or region.

## **From Eden to Eternity**

Our main focus for the reading plan was relational, that is, to get to know the heart, mind, and presence of God. We heard so many positive compliments from attendees as they went chronologically through the Bible together. There was encouragement in going through the same sections of scripture together, and comfort in knowing others were also struggling with certain sections of the Bible. We had over fifty individuals start the reading plan at the beginning of the year. Around ten completed the reading plan, and many are still working their way through it. No matter where you land on having completed the reading, still working through it, or having stepped away from it, I'm proud of everyone who went on that journey with us and dedicated a large portion of their time to hearing from God in His Word.

Along the way, we gave glory to God by placing a bean inside a jar each time we allowed God to work through us. I know we did way more for God than our beans show, but I hope it helped us better understand how God is using us, the part we play in the Kingdom of God, and the immensity of God's endeavors through the body of Christ.

## **Peace in God's Guidance: Our Shepherd in Times of Stress**

As the ministry team looks towards God's leading for 2026, there has been a recurring focus on anxiety as a concept to consider. As a church, we will be navigating Peace in God's Guidance amid anxiety, stress, distress, and life's challenges.

We are starting the year off with men's and women's groups finding encouragement from God together. In the spring, the church will rally around the children as we offer Emerald Crossing, a curriculum navigating Psalm 23 and the idea of overcoming anxiety. In our aim to find a worthy community service project that will also have a significant impact for the Kingdom of God, we will invite a professional counselor to speak as part of our outreach to the community.

Our initiative goals are to support each other in overcoming the anxiety and stress that affects many in our community, offering the comfort of God and practical steps to move forward. In addition to establishing a clear mission for church attendees to unite around, it is a brief commitment that showcases visible results and accommodates a diverse range of spiritual gifts and talents.

## **Analytics**

There are 152 people connected with Sturgis Missionary Church. Of the one hundred fifty-two, one hundred twenty-seven regular attendees, sixteen irregular attendees, seven participants (shared custody or only attend on midweeks), and two are away at college.

Our average Sunday attendance was ninety-five (seventy-three adults and twenty-two children), with eighteen online attendees. We ended the year with fifty-two church members.

During the year, we had three new professions of faith.

# YOUTH REPORT

2025 marked our ninth full year of Youth Ministry here at SMC. Thank you for the opportunity to invest in this next generation. The following will include the Youth Group's vision; spiritual wins; teen Sunday school; mid-week youth group; fellowship; Digging Deeper; 11:ONE Mentorship; prayer; and goals for 2026.

## **Vision**

"To unify teens (Grades 6th – 12th) and leaders in the pursuit of knowing, loving, and following Christ. The goal of this pursuit is that teens would be encouraged through loving relationships to use their gifts and develop tools to build God's Kingdom".

## **Wins**

In thinking over the last year there were several highlights of youth ministry that I would consider wins.

- After expressing her concern for an area she was struggling with, one teen said to Brittney in a text, "I also would like to start knowing God more and having him in my life. You probably won't see this till the morning but I would like it to happen sometime." There was more interest in mentorship!
- Several of the teens seem to be growing spiritually. (Allison, Cloie, Simon, Brianna, Corbin)
- Friends of teens inviting friends (There were 21 teens one regular Wednesday night).
- 2 first-time commitments (Brianna and Kate)! Both of them are interested in getting Baptized.
- Several helped to teach a youth lesson (Juli, Tristan, Allison and Cloie).
- Teens came over to our home impromptu and had a blast, which helped develop better connection! (a couple guys even ended up spending the night and another time girls spent the night)
- Several teens are helping with the Children's Church (Allison, Salma, and Brianna).
- Two high school teens helped as young youth leaders (Juli and Tristan).
- One teen helped on the worship team (Juli).

**We are so thankful to God for His work in the lives of the teens.**

## **Teen Sunday School**

The Teen Sunday School started small (couple teens) again this year, but then over this summer we asked teens to come to Sunday school as a sort of mentorship. We started having 6ish teens each Sunday. Having started with Genesis the year before we continued going through the Old testament, reading the major Bible stories and discussing how they apply to our lives today. Over the summer we split the guys and the girls for two different mentorship groups. In the fall we started using the SOAP (Scripture, Observation, Application, Prayer) method to study the book of John. Our average at the end of the year is around 4 teens.

## **Mid-Week Youth Group**

Wednesday nights are a topical study and include both a game and a snack to help grow relationships and encourage teens to come. The first part of the year we continued with our theme on "Steps to Maturity" with topics on spiritual disciplines, work ethic and working for God. We took a break from this series over the summer and had theme nights with lessons that somehow tied to the theme of the night. Some of these theme nights were Pirate Night, Sports, backyard Olympics, Christmas in July, graveyard scavenger hunt, and volleybomb. Normally our attendance is down over the summer, but this last summer we had some of our biggest attendance in a while - consistently 12 to 15 teens.

In the fall we discussed relationships (Authority, Friend, and Guy/Girl relationships) since several of the teens were interested in boyfriends/girlfriends. In the late fall the youth group grew again with an average attendance of 15 or more (with a high of 21!)

## Fellowship

We have scheduled fellowship times in the form of fun events. The goal is to do one fun event each month, the purpose being fellowship, and to encourage youth involvement and unity. Fun activities for 2025 included:

## Digging Deeper

This was the third year of Digging Deeper Youth Bible Camp. It was held at Sturgis Missionary Church, which was an awesome place to have it! Although Sturgis Missionary plays a big role in the Digging Deeper Youth Bible Camp, we have chosen to make it a community camp. We hold to a belief in God as revealed through His infallible Word, the Bible. Our mission is to help teens 6th through 12th grade grow in desire and ability to read and study the Bible; faith and relationship with God; and relationship with like-minded peers.

This year's theme was "Bring the Word: In, Through, and Out". We talked about how God/God's Word changes us on the inside first, which then affects our actions and words. **God worked in teens' hearts!!**

Following are some of the wins:

- 20 teens from 6 different churches, and 7 counselors (1 was a former Digging Deeper camper), and leaders from multiple churches ate, played, worshiped, prayed, studied the Bible, and grew closer to God together.
- Teens really enjoyed the worship. Multiple teens mentioned that it was a favorite part of their day.
- Bailey Horn was the main speaker. He brought amazing content, and he was very engaging for the teens! Many of the teens really enjoyed him.
- A majority of teens raised their hands saying that they grew at least a little bit in the study of the Bible.
- After camp a mother shared how the camp caused their daughter to grow spiritually and how it seemed that reading God's Word wasn't as intimidating. A father said the camp allowed for multiple conversations about reading the Bible.
